

COMMUNITY SERVICE SPOTLIGHT

In honor of Economic and Community Development Month, the Rotary Club of Princeton awarded the first quarterly development grant in a partnership with the Chamber of Commerce of the Two Virginias and the Princeton Economic Development Authority (PEDA). This joint venture, named the Princeton Business Works Grant, provides a funding source valued at \$1,250 each quarter to provide relief for a Princeton business planning improvement projects. Qualifying expenses include signage, conversion of storefronts, and contracted services for direct business support projects. The Rotary Club of Princeton and the Princeton Economic Development Authority both provide \$500 per quarter and the Chamber provides \$250 per quarter.

Applications are solicited from Princeton businesses once each quarter. They are reviewed by a committee of Rotarians, with an ex-officio member from the Chamber and one from PEDA. An



application is chosen based on several pre-determined criteria. There were six applications submitted for the first quarterly grant. The winner of the first grant, Angela Conrad, is the owner of Wild Roots Coffee Shop in the Princeton Grassroots District. The Grant will be used for improvements in building security and the entrance to the building. The winner comes to a club meeting to speak about their business and places a winner's banner in front of the business for a month.

PUBLIC IMAGE TIPS

During this month of *Thanksgiving* (and since many clubs will be hosting food drives/food packing events in anticipation of the holidays), I want to take a moment to remind you of the Rotary Feed10Million Campaign. Rotary Zones 33/34 launched this initiative a couple of years ago with the goal of feeding 10 million people. They are continuing these efforts during this Rotary year and are asking all clubs that participate in such events to take a couple of minutes to log the information. Many different activities count toward this goal, such as food packing events, serving at a soup kitchen, providing funds/donations to a food bank, backpack buddy meal programs, etc.. **You can even log past events that have taken place during this Rotary year.** The process is simple:

Visit <https://www.rizones33-34.org/feed10million-initiative/> and click on the “Click Here to Log Your Meals” button. Complete the one-page online form. (Please note that your club is located in Zone 33-District 7545). You can upload up to 5 pictures from your event. If you didn’t provide individual meals, it is recommended that you follow the guideline of estimating the amount of food provided and using 1 pound = 1 meal. If it is a financial donation, they recommend using 25 cents per meal as a guide. If you have questions or problems logging the information, please let me know. I am happy to assist in any way to help out with the process.

#Feed10Million is also a great way to promote your club on different social media platforms! So, as you are logging your events, don’t forget to share photos online of your club’s efforts to feed the hungry. This demonstrates the impact that you have on your local community!



Congratulations to all the clubs and individual Rotarians recognized at this year's Foundation banquet on November 4th. Among our clubs:

- Five were recognized as top Polio Plus contributors with the Grafton Club leading the pack at \$8,862 donated.
- Four were recognized as top Annual Fund contributors, all four of which gave over \$12,000. Led by the Cheat Lake club, the top three were separated by under \$150.
- Eight clubs were recognized for total giving of over \$14,000, led by the Charleston club.

FUN FACTS OF THE MONTH

This month's Fun Facts are from Appendix M of the District Member Care Manual. Haven't seen it? Check it out on the District website under Club Resources.

Rotary and the United Nations: During and after World War II, Rotarians became increasingly involved in promoting international understanding. In 1945, 49 Rotary members served in 29 delegations to the United Nations Charter Conference.

Rotary still actively participates in UN conferences by sending observers to major meetings and promoting the United Nations in Rotary publications. Rotary International's relationship with the United Nations Educational, Scientific, and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) dates back to a 1943 London Rotary conference that promoted international cultural and educational exchanges. Attended by ministers of education and observers from around the world, and chaired by a past president of RI, the conference was an impetus to the establishment of UNESCO in 1946.

Exchange of Club Banners: One of the colorful traditions of many Rotary clubs is the exchange of small banners, flags or pennants. Rotarians traveling to distant locations often take banners to exchange at "make up" meetings as a token of friendship. Many clubs use the decorative banners they have received for attractive displays at club meetings and district events.

The Rotary International board recognized the growing popularity of the banner exchange back in 1959 and suggested that those clubs which participate in such exchanges give careful thought to the design of their banners in order that they be distinctive and expressive of the community and country of which the club is a part. The board was also mindful of the financial burden such exchange may impose upon some clubs, especially in popular areas where many visitors make up and request to exchange. In all

instances, clubs are cautioned to exercise discretion and moderation in the exchange of banners in order that the financial obligations do not interfere with the basic service activities of the club. Exchanging club banners is a very pleasant custom, especially when a creative and artistic banner tells an interesting story of community pride. The exchange of banners is a significant tradition of Rotary and serves as tangible symbol of our international fellowship.



NEWS FROM AROUND THE DISTRICT

DISTRICT GOVERNOR NOMINATIONS SOUGHT

Each year Rotary Clubs in each district have the opportunity to participate in the selection of the future District Governor of their district through the process of nominating candidates for District Governor Nominee-designate (DGND). In accordance with our district's manual of procedures, that time occurs in the fall of each year. Nominations are now being sought for the Office of District Governor of Rotary International District 7545 for Rotary year 2025-26.

Each club President received an email this month outlining the process for submitting nominations. Completed nomination packages must be submitted no later than December 31, 2022

If you have a candidate you feel should be considered for nomination as our next District Governor Nominee-designate, please notify your club President.

The District Nominating Committee will meet in January to conduct interviews of nominated candidates and select the DGND. The name of the individual selected will be published in February.

DISTRICT CLUBS HOST NUMEROUS POLIO PLUS EVENTS

Rotary Clubs around the district sponsored activities and events to both educate their communities on Rotary's #1 external priority to eradicate polio and to raise funds for the Rotary Foundation Polio Plus Fund.

The Grafton Club was the clear winner in terms of funds raised. The home club of our District Polio Plus Chair, Greg Cartwright, their club sponsored five different polio related events activities:

- Road block fundraiser
- Walk-a-thon for polio
- Penny Wars at a local middle school
- Hat Day at a local elementary school
- Polio Plus Society recruiting campaign*

Through the combined efforts of the Grafton Club, \$8,862 has been provided to The Rotary Foundation's Polio Plus Fund.

Here's some other examples of what clubs around the district did to support Rotary's polio eradication efforts during the month of October:

- The Bridgeport, Clarksburg, Weston and Fairmont clubs continued their Putt Putt for Polio competition
- The Clarksburg Rotary Club sponsored an educational billboard which was featured in last month's District Newsletter
- The Kingwood Club hosted a Pints for Polio event
- The Weston Club conducted a "Smok'in hot Rotarian T-shirt fundraiser including auctioning off a shirt signed by RI President Jennifer Jones
- The Beckley Club collected pocket change for polio
- The Putnam County Commission proclaimed Tuesday, October 25th as World Polio Day in Putnam County and the Rotary Club conducted a Dining Out to End Polio in Scott Depot both to raise funds and awareness

- The Buckhannon Upshur club hosted a Cookies for a Cause fundraiser during which packaged homemade cookies were sold in the community
- The Wood County and Parkersburg Clubs hosted a Team Trivia Night

As you can see, the possibilities are endless. They're also not limited to October either. If your club hasn't sponsored a polio event, use some of these ideas or create your own. Our efforts to eradicate this disease can't and won't end until the world is declared polio free.

ELKINS ROTARY CLUB PARTNERS WITH LIONS CLUB TO SUPPORT COMMUNITY BLESSING BOXES



CANYON RIM HOSTS TASTE OF BRIDGE DAY

On Friday, October 14th, the Canyon Rim Rotary Club and its partners hosted their first post-COVID Taste of Bridge Day event at Adventures on the Gorge in Fayette County. An estimated crowd of 2,000 participated in the event which raised close to \$15,000 to support the club's ongoing efforts to support Fayette County.

Taste of Bridge Day is the official kickoff event of the Bridge Day weekend in Fayette County. This year, 11 food vendors participated serving about 40 different dishes. And it wasn't just food vendors either, seven retail / arts & craft vendors also participated.



32 event sponsors and monetary sponsorships covered the event expenses. Adventures On The Gorge hosted the event. Starry Eyes Media designed and printed posters, rack cards, and menus at a substantial discount. 59 News donated substantial advertising time and provided excellent coverage of the event. WTNJ Radio donated a live remote at the event and allowed in studio promotions. The Fayette County Chamber handled online ticket sales.

Nearly 40 volunteers helped out on the day of the event from partnering organizations such as Delta Kappa Gamma, Blooms By Bessie, and Scouts BSA Troup 179. Three Bridge Day pageant queens helped present awards.

A superb event coordinated by one of the smaller clubs in our district and an excellent example of partnering to benefit the local community.


HOW DOES YOUR CLUB FARE?

Margot (Germany) reports that she is doing very well and making lots of friends. Her host family only speaks German at home which helps her learn the language.

Natalie (Mexico) has also made several friends and has helped her host Rotary club with their project to prepare bags for the homeless in their community.

Both young ladies are doing well but are finding that language is the most difficult hurdle, especially in class. I'm sure both will adjust quickly and become experts in the language of their host countries. Young people have a way of adjusting to the language fairly quickly. Big thank-you to the Kingwood and the Elkins Rotary Clubs and District 7545 for making it possible for these young ladies to experience their dream.

How about students in your community? Isn't there some young person (age 15 – 19) who would love to have a year-long adventure in another country learning the language and culture while making lots of new friends? It costs the sponsoring club very little. Just some time to find an interested young person and purchasing a blazer for the student. The sponsoring club can help with other costs if they want but are not required to do so. The parents are responsible for travel and insurance and the host Rotary club in the foreign country is responsible for housing, feeding and nurturing the student. These Long-term exchanges (10 – 12 months) are life-changing!

Applications for Long-Term Exchange are available on the Ohio-Erie website and are due by December 15th.
