




- Host a Discover Rotary session to invite potential new members to learn more about Rotary
- Designate a club meeting in May for club members to bring a friend to your Rotary meeting
- Build a list of prospective members in your community and assign club members to extend personal invitations to join an upcoming club meeting
- Start a contest to encourage members to bring in new member candidates and establish an incentive appropriate to your club
- Make calls to former members of your club and invite them back to Rotary
- Check out the strategies recommended for your club in the Membership Success Center under the MAP icon on DACdb
- Be sure all your new members are recorded on your club roles, including those you've identified as new Impact or Companion Club members
- Run the Club Compare feature in DACdb to ensure your club's records are in sync between DACdb and Rotary International.

COMMUNITY SERVICE SPOTLIGHT

MAKING AN IMPACT! The District 7545 Conference food packing event was a great success. Forty-eight Rotarians were organized into teams of twelve and immediately became four efficient assembly lines of food packing power. We packed 10,440 meals for hungry West Virginians in an hour and twenty minutes.



Many Rotarians are familiar with Rise Against Hunger events. Heaven Sent Ministries events are similar, and their international food

recipe is the same. However, district Rotarians wanted to help hungry West Virginians at this event, and Heaven Sent has two domestic recipes which are

popular in area food banks and pantries.

Rotarians packed the Apple Cinnamon Oatmeal Recipe. When prepared, each bag will provide up to six meals for a hungry family.

Most of the Rotarians that participated took one or more boxes of two hundred sixteen meals home to their local food pantry. I think that is called "making an impact!"

Congratulations to "Team Tangerine" for finishing their packing first. I am sure it was having RIPN Stephanie Urchick on the team that made the difference!


- 1. Pick your platform (start with one)
- 2. Assign roles (identify a photographer and content manager)
- 3. Be consistent (post regularly)
- 4. Take photos that tell a story (images that show action)
- 5. Lead with impact and encourage engagement (make social media part of your event planning)
- 6. Celebrate partnership and participation (tag participants and avoid Rotary jargon)
- 7. Find inspiration (look at the social media posts of others for inspiration)
- 8. Use the Brand Center (your one-stop shop for creative assets and guidelines)

FUN FACTS OF THE MONTH

This month's Fun facts come from southern district of Rotary (https://www.southerndistricts-rotary.com/images/rotary information/7 SOME%20ROTARY%20FIRSTS%20AND%20FACTS.pdf)

- District 9100 which comprises 14 West African Countries is recognized as the largest geographical District in the Rotary world. It was created in 1985 and uses three official languages - English, French, and Portuguese.
- The Rotary Club of Papeete, Tahiti, which is located in the middle of the Pacific Ocean is the club that is most remote from any other.
- The southernmost Rotary meeting is that of the Rotary Club of Base Marambio-Antartida in Antarctica. If in the area you can also visit the Rotary Club of Base Antarctica Esperanza. Both are Spanish speaking clubs that meet Wednesday evenings



- To visit the northernmost club you must travel above the Arctic Circle to the Rotary Club of Barrow, Alaska, U.S.A.
- If you attend the El Aguilar club in Argentina, you are meeting with the highest club in the world at 16,000 feet (4,880 meters) above sea level.
- The lowest club meets at 40 feet (12.2 meters) below sea level at El Centro, California, USA.
- There are 69 Rotary clubs with the word "Tokyo" in their club names.
- It is said that there is a Rotary meeting being held someplace in the world every hour of every day. If
 you attended one meeting per day, it would take nearly 80 years to visit all of the more than 34,500
 Rotary clubs in the world, and by that time, no doubt, there would be thousands more new clubs to
 attend

WORLD ASSOCIATION OF MARCHING SHOW BANDS CHAMPIONSHIP NEEDS VOLUNTEERS

As reported in the February Newsletter, The World Association of Marching Show Bands (WAMSB) is holding their world championship competition in Buckhannon West Virginia from July 17-26, 2023. This is only the second time the event has been held in the U.S.

WAMSB is an international association of marching show bands from 32 nations and the event promises to showcase the talents of young people from across the globe.

NATIONAL SCOUT JAMBOREE RETURNS TO SOUTHERN WV

The Boy Scouts of America is holding another National Scout Jamboree at The Summit Bechtel Reserve this summer, the first national jamboree since 2017. As was the case with prior jamborees, volunteers will greet day visitors to the jamboree at the J.W. & Hazel Ruby West Virginia Welcome Center off U.S.-19 in Mount Hope.

CART BUCKETS DISTRIBUTED AT DISTRICT CONFERENCE

District CART Champion Walt Hall of the St Albans Rotary Club was out and about distributing CART buckets to District 7545 Rotary Clubs at this year's District Conference.

Not familiar with CART? CART was founded in 1995 by Roger Ackerman, a Rotarian in Sumter, SC. The CART Fund (Coins for Alzheimer's Research Trust) is a non-profit grassroots organization that provides "seed" money for cutting edge, high impact research grants to help find a treatment or cure for Alzheimer's Disease.

CART buckets are used to collect pocket change at Rotary meetings. 100% of every dollar donated goes directly to research! And since 1999, funds collected have enabled 64 grants totaling more than \$11 million to be awarded to 62 recognized research institutions in the United States.

The CART Fund is a 501(C)3 organization (Federal ID #31-1466051) governed by an Executive Committee and a Board of Directors composed of representatives from qualified Rotary districts that support the program.

While primarily supported by members of Rotary Clubs in the United States, CART has an active volunteer base and can accept donations of major gifts, bequests or volunteer efforts from anyone. A new donor recognition program was recently introduced, allowing "recurring donors" through the

online system to be designated as members of the "Roger Ackerman Circle."

NEWS FROM OUTSIDE OUR DISTRICT

BE CAREFUL WHAT YOU POST!

Rotary International recently sent a reminder to club Presidents and District Leaders regarding the need for vigilance to avoid copyright infringements in web postings. Here's an excerpt from that communication:

The U.S. Rotary Club & District Liability Insurance Program provides all U.S. Rotary and Rotaract clubs and districts with general liability and directors & officers/employment practices liability insurance. Rotary districts/clubs have posted images and other media (cartoons, songs, etc) online in disregard of copyright laws, resulting in a considerable increase in claims activity under the U.S. Rotary Club & District Liability Insurance Program ("Program"). Over 40% of the Program's open claims now pertain to copyright infringement.



Copyright owners hire companies offering software that "trolls" the internet in search of copyright violations involving their images or other media. These companies are commonly referred to as copyright trolls. When a troll finds a violation, they contact the party who mis-used the image or other media and make a demand to settle the violation. Failure to respond to the demand increases the difficulty of resolving the claim.

It is your Rotary district's/club's responsibility to comply with copyright laws. As a general rule, instead of lifting images or other media off the internet, use images or other media created by members of your Rotary district/club (after first having received their permission) or use the Rotary Brand Center.



ROTARY MAGAZINE DIGITAL EDITION AVAILABLE

One way to reduce the cost of your Rotary membership is to shift to the digital edition of the Rotary Magazine. For those interested in doing so, the process is simple. Go to:

Be sure to have your Rotary ID number handy (you can get it from your DACdb profile).

If you sign up this month, you'll start receiving the digital edition in July and reduce your Rotary Magazine subscription cost by half.

SOUTHERN MICHIGAN CLUB TURNS MELON SEEDS INTO CASH

Southern Michigan lore tells of a wanderer who handed melon seeds to a greenhouse owner. The resulting Howell melon has been celebrated by townsfolk with an annual festival now in its 63rd year. The Rotary Club of Howell has gotten in on the festivities by selling a Howell melon—flavored ice cream.

In August the 40-member club sold 7,000 cups of the ice cream and 1,500 half-gallon containers over the weekend fair. More than 100 people, including Rotarians, members of the Interact Club of Howell High School, and school athletes, pitched in to help.





The endeavor scooped up \$30,000 for scholarships, local youth programs, and other community projects. "It's so popular that no matter what time we say we're going to start selling there's going to be a line," says Sandie Cortez, a past president of the Howell club. "People go crazy over this."
