CLUB IN THE SPOTLIGHT

Chartered February 11th, 1988 the Rotary Club of South Fairmont is 62 members strong and growing. In fact, the club has grown in five months of this Rotary year, an impressive accomplishment, increasing its membership by 12.7% in just eight months.



One of the clubs in Area 4 supported by Area Governor Joshua Stear, the club's signature project is Celebration of Lights, a winter lights display of over 500 LED seasonal Christmas lights that light up the City of Fairmont's Morris Park November and December each year since 2006. Listed as one of the top 10 light displays to visit in West Virginia by WV Tourism, it has taken on a life of its own. In 2023, the project saw over 26,000 people view the displays, raising over \$50,000. Since it began, in excess of 200,000 people have seen the light display resulting in an excess of \$400,000 for Marion County community service agencies. The club also maintains a High School Scholarship Fund, donating \$1,000 to a graduate of each of the four Marion County schools with the support of District grant funds.

According to Club President Dale Dzielski: "It is our members that make 'Service Above Self' a reality in our club's ability to reach so many in need across our Marion County community. I attribute our growth to the infectious energy our leadership team and all of our members create by serving with their time, resources, and giving."

CLUB VISIONING SUPPORT AVAILABLE



Does your club have a current strategic plan? If not, help is available to assist you in creating one. DGN Rick Macak is leading a team of district Rotarians who are prepared to conduct club visitations and assist you through the process. A detailed email on the subject was recently sent explaining the program in more detail.

The process includes an in-person, four-hour session with club members (two two-hour virtual sessions are also available if an in person session is not possible).

Each Club requesting Vision Facilitation will designate a "Club Coordinator" who will work with the District Team Coordinator to provide

information and direction to club members. Procedurally, the District Team will lead the process consisting of an overview presentation, a writing exercise, data collection, consensus voting and breakout exercise with sample action plan development. The Club will then develop Action plans for each goal under the platform of a three-year Master Plan. This is the "Vision to Success" step and will continue to be developed by the Club and monitored by the District Team.

PRISTINE RIVERS INITIATIVE BEING LAUNCHED

One of the blessings of living in West Virginia is the abundant water supply provided by our rivers and streams. In fact, The West Virginia Encyclopedia indicates West Virginia has nearly 40,000 stream miles, "one of the highest densities of any region in North America." That's the good news!

Unfortunately, many of those streams and watersheds are encumbered by liter, and particularly by plastics that contaminate both our rivers and our oceans. Check out this <u>link</u> to get a sense of what happens to plastics deposited in our rivers.

Rotarian John Lichter of our Morgantown North Rotary Club is passionate about ensuring West Virginia rivers are clean and is initiating a Pristine Rivers Initiative to ensure they are. The Goal of the Pristine Rivers Initiative is to eliminate litter in West Virginia Rivers initially and eventually to expand that effort to other watersheds.

Twenty years of experience gained by the Coal River Group cleaning up the Coal River Watershed has provided a playbook that is acting as a model to encourage individuals who are passionate about cleaning our watersheds



to join this effort. Similar initiatives have started on tributaries of the Monongahela River near Morgantown, as well as several other watersheds aligned with the Tug, Tygart, New, Gauley, Kanawha and Greenbrier Rivers.

John is organizing a charter group of Rotarians throughout the State to assist in developing this Pristine Rivers Initiative for West Virginia. This program is expected to develop as an outreach effort to attract others to Rotary that are passionate about cleaning up our rivers and watersheds. The initiative is anticipated to lead to the eventual development of a Rotary International Program of Scale to expand this effort.

Youth Exchange: Youth Exchange Jayla Reams from Elkins has been accepted as a Rotary Youth Exchange Student to Ecuador. (<u>RYLA applications on district website</u>).

Jayla Reams of Elkins has been selected to be an outbound Rotary Youth Exchange student from District 7545. Jayla will be studying in Ecuador for the 2024-2025 year.

Jayla is currently a sophomore at Elkins High School. She enjoys athletics, playing volleyball, swimming and running track. Additionally, she is taking jujitsu training and is involved in the Old Brick theater program. She participates in activities reflecting Service Above Self



by volunteering at Feed the City and helps with the Mountaineer Food Bank Truck.

While Jayla has traveled throughout the United States, this will be her first adventure outside the United States. In the next few months, Jayla will be preparing for her year abroad by studying about her host country, getting her travel papers in order and putting together a presentation in Spanish about her home and interests.
